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 A resident from Southfield Road spoke an issue of overhanging trees the other side of her property boundary. Members present gave some advice to the resident on how to deal with the issue.

87/25. Chair Announcements (For information Only)

- The Chair said she has called an Extraordinary Meeting of the Council for next week to
 discuss whether to renew the existing contract with Free2Talk. The Chair and the Clerk
 are willing to sit down with others to discuss the issue between now and next Thursday
 if they want.
- The Chair said she has been contacted by some residents about their concerns over a new Vape Shop opening in the Village Centre. The Clerk is speaking with the local ward councillors about it.
- The Chair said the date for the New Duston West by-election is Thursday 30th October 2025 with The Duston School being a polling station.
- Been working with the Clerk on a new draft café lease and hopefully this will be finalised in the near future.

88/25. To receive any information on Section 106 / Community Infrastructure Levy

• No update at present but there is a WNC Conference coming up later this month and there maybe an opportunity to get more information then.

89/25. Councillors Reports

- Cllr Edkins and Cllr Dickinson spoke about doing a litter pick. Cllr Dickinson said Limehurst Square recently is looking better following a series of litter picks in the area.
- Cllr Spink said the Battle of Britain event went well. There was 44 people who attended. Cllr Spink praised the DPC staff for organising such a successful event.
- Cllr Carol Kirk asked about the sound system. At present the Clerk is looking into it. It is likely that the Government will change the law to allow online and hybrid meetings so it might be more cost effective in the long run to get some kind of conference system.
- It was reported the sad passing of Mick O'Leary who was a Deacon at St Patricks Church in Ashwood Road.

90/25. Flood Warden

 West Northamptonshire Council have asked Duston Parish Council to nominate someone to be the local Flood Warden. Flood wardens are members of the local community who volunteer to help their communities become more resilient and prepared for flooding (APPENDIX B).

• **RESOLVED:** Cllr Andrew Dickinson is nominated to be the Flood Warden for Duston Parish Council.

91/25. A New Four Year Plan

- The Clerk outlined the few changes that have occurred since last month.
- Councillor Liddon said this new Four Year Plan will help to shape the forthcoming budget. Cllr Ingram agreed with this.
- RESOLVED: Adopt the new Four Year Plan for Duston Parish Council as a flexible, evolving document that will be updated as needed. The plan outlines ambitious goals for the Council and Duston.

- The Clerk outlined the cost pressures on the Council. At present it is assumed all asset transfers will go head. The Council also needs to continue to buy up its funds so it is in a good position to take over the full maintenance of the parks in June 2028.
- The Clerk said the Four Year Plan is ambitious and would require significant financial investment in this next budget.
- Cllr Kirk said she would like to see a sound system for Duston Community Centre in the is next budget,
- RESOLVED: To note the report (APPENDIX C) and the discussion on the budget 2026/27.

98/25. Christmas Tree at St Francis Church

- Cllr Ingram proposed that the Council should plant a Christmas Tree at St Francis Church, subject to permission.
- RESOLVED: To plant a Christmas Tree at St Francis Church on the grass area (subject to the church approval). The Clerk will discuss with Rev Marriott as to the precise location of the tree.

99/25. Errington Park Path

- WNC Planning said the project can go ahead.
- Duston Parish Council hopes to use S106 funds to do the path. The Clerk, Gary Youens, will contact the ward councillors to ask for their support.
- RESOLVED: To note the WNC Planning response to the proposed path in Errington Park.

100/25. Neighbourhood Governance Review

 The Government has unveiled the English Devolution and Community Empowerment Bill, which proposes a new authority type and mandates councils to set up neighbourhood governance structures. It will issue guidance on how neighbourhood governance structures can work well with town and parish councils (APPENDIX K)

- The consultation period from the Department of Housing Communities & Local Government is currently open.
- It is likely that the WNC will have to set up "Area Boards" or "Area Committees" and maybe this is what the LAPs will turn into in due course.
- RESOLVED: The Clerk will respond to the consultation on behalf of Duston Parish Council.

101/25. Harlestone Road Affordable Housing Scheme on Former Airflow site

- Duston Parish Council has held negotiations with Vistry Homes about adopting the public open space on the development (subject to planning permission).
- Vistry Homes have offered the site to West Northamptonshire Council for a variety of affordable housing. A view was expressed that more affordable housing in Duston should be welcomed.
- The Council discussed the report APPENDIX L. If the site gets planning permission it is likely to be finished sometime in 2027 or early 2028.

RESOLVED:

- a) The Council reaffirmed its commitment in principle to adopt all the public open space within proposed Vistry Homes development on Harlestone Road including the play area, wooded area and the attenuation pond.
- b) The Council will appoint a solicitor to act on behalf of DPC on this transfer.
- c) The Clerk will report back to Full Council prior to any final agreement.
- d) The WNC Council Report on the Harlestone Road Development was noted (APPENDIX M).

Potential Acquisition of the Freehold – St Luke's Centre and St Luke's Field

1. Purpose of the Report

To inform Members about the background and current status of the St Luke's Centre and Field, and to seek Council's view on whether to pursue the acquisition of the freehold from West Northamptonshire Council (as successor authority to Northamptonshire County Council).

2. Background

- St Luke's Centre and Field were originally St Luke's Lower School and its playing field.
- The school closed as part of Northamptonshire's move from a three-tier to a two-tier education system. The school relocated outside Duston Parish to a new site in Upton.
- Most redundant school sites in Duston, such as Ryeland Road Middle School, were sold for housing.
- Responding to community concern about the loss of local facilities, Duston Parish Council stepped in to help save the St Luke's site.

3. Lease Arrangement

- In 2012, Duston Parish Council entered into a 99-year lease with Northamptonshire County Council for St Luke's Centre and Field.
- The lease allows the Parish Council to have commercial tenants, helping to offset running and maintenance costs.
- The building is historic, with parts dating to the mid-nineteenth century, and lies within a planning conservation area, increasing maintenance costs.
- Since 2012, the Parish Council has managed the building and field, maintaining them as community assets and spaces for local use.

4. Current Position

- Over the past 13 years, the Parish Council has invested considerable funds in maintaining and operating the Centre.
- Members have expressed a long-standing desire to secure the freehold ownership of the property, as reflected in both the Corporate Plan and Four-Year Action Plan.

Duston Parish Council already owns the adjacent public open space, historically known as Melbourne Lane Park, meaning freehold acquisition would consolidate management and enhance long-term planning for the wider area.

5. Advantages of Acquiring the Freehold

- Provides long-term security for community use of the building and field.
- Gives the Council greater freedom and flexibility to invest, improve, or develop the facilities.
- Reduces potential bureaucracy associated with lease management and landlord approvals.
- May enable the Parish Council to access funding not always available to leaseholders.

6. Considerations

- The acquisition would likely require formal negotiation with West Northamptonshire Council (WMC), which now holds the freehold.
- An independent valuation and legal advice would be needed to assess financial
- implications.

 WMC's asset strategy and ongoing property reviews will influence whether they are
- willing to dispose of the freehold.
 The Parish Council would need to consider potential upfront costs and long-term maintenance liabilities.

7. Recommendation

Council is invited to:

- 1. Confirm in principle whether it wishes to pursue the acquisition of the freehold of St Luke's Centre and Field, subject to feasibility.
- 2. Authorise the Clerk to make initial enquiries with West Northamptonshire Council regarding the potential transfer or purchase of the freehold.
- 3. If West Northamptonshire Council agree appoint a solicitor to oversee the transfer
- 4. The Clerk will keep the Council and/or Resources & General Purposes Committee

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VOLUNTEER POLICY AND PROCEDURES

This document sets out the policy and procedures relating to the engagement and management of volunteers in activities authorised by Duston Parish Council (DPC).

Introduction

- 1. DPC pledges to offer volunteer opportunities to all sectors of the community; local organisations, groups and individuals to work together in partnership.
- 2. This engagement seeks to increase contact with the community we serve and help build strong connections to ensure the relevance of the services we provide in addressing the needs of our community.
- 3. DPC recognize the positive health & wellbeing benefits of volunteering and as such, supports all staff in encouraging inclusivity of volunteers, where appropriate, to assist in the ongoing development of DPC.
- 4. DPC does not aim to introduce volunteers to replace paid staff.

Policy

- 1. DPC will maintain a list of volunteers (name and address, telephone number and/or email). Volunteers are asked to notify the DPC of any changes to those details or to request removal of those details from the database if they no longer wish to volunteer. This info will **not** be shared to any third party.
 - 2. Volunteers should be competent to carry out a role. The nature of skills required will depend on the activity.
 - 3. Where the volunteer is under the age of 18 they must be accompanied by a responsible adult, parent/guardian or the leader of the relevant organisation or scheme.
 - 4. Where appropriate, relevant training will be provided in advance of the volunteer working on site.
 - 5. Where appropriate, Volunteers will be briefed regarding the task and its purpose, health, safety and supervision arrangements before commencement of work.
 - 6. Volunteers are expected to advise the DPC lead if they have any medical issues that would put either them or other volunteers at risk relevant to the task.
 - 7. Volunteers working at the sole request of and under the sole control of the DPC will be insured under the Parish Council's Public Liability and Employers Liability cover.
 - 8. Volunteers should only carry out tasks allocated to them.

9. Should it be necessary for groups to split off, a 'lead' volunteer should be appointed and given the mobile phone number of the primary point of contact should a situation arise.

10. Prior to work commencing, a visual inspection and or risk assessment of the site will be carried out to ensure that there are no obvious hazards. These inspections are to be recorded.

11. Volunteers should have due regard to the fact that they are carrying out authorised work on behalf of the Parish Council and as such are representing the Council, in terms of both the quality of work and possible interaction with the public.

12. A copy of this policy must be given to and read by volunteers along with a data capture form the first time they undertake work on behalf of the DPC. The policy will be re-issued to volunteers if any material changes to the policy are made.

Procedures

1. The appropriate risk assessment document must be referred to before commencement of work or a risk assessment undertaken prior to commencement of work where a new project arises. The Parish Clerk is to receive a signed and dated copy of the risk assessment.

2. Volunteers must undergo an induction briefing appropriate for the task(s) being undertaken. This should include a description of the work to be undertaken and known issues and risks

3. Volunteers will be expected to sign the induction briefing sheet, showing that they have received an induction brief, they understand the nature of the work, they recognise the risks associated with the task and agree to comply with instructions provided during the induction brief. This document is not intended to form a contract.

4. On completion of the work, the completed induction brief is to be kept on file with the Risk Assessment sheet. Retention of induction briefs will allow the DPC to record work and ultimately acknowledge the contributions to the community made by volunteers.

Duston Parish Council Volunteer Data Capture

The details given in the Volunteer Welcome Pack (APPENDIX A) by the volunteer will be maintained by the Parish Clerk. All information will be kept safe and confidential and will not be used for any other purpose.

It is essential that a volunteer advises the supervisor of an activity or the Parish Clerk of any illness or ailment that could put either themselves or other volunteers at risk of either injury or harm, while working on a task.

Where a volunteer can no longer support the community, they are to contact the Parish Clerk requesting their details are removed from list at their earliest opportunity.

CCTV POLICY

1. Purpose

This Policy governs the management, operation, and lawful use of the Parish Council's Closed-Circuit Television (CCTV) system in compliance with:

- Data Protection Act 2018
- UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR)
- Protection of Freedoms Act 2012
- Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) CCTV Code of Practice

CCTV is installed for the following legitimate purposes:

- Protecting Parish Council buildings, property, and assets
- Promoting staff, councillor, contractor, and visitor health, safety, and welfare
- Preventing, deterring, and detecting criminal or anti-social behaviour (including theft, vandalism, harassment, intimidation)
- Supporting law enforcement in the investigation and prosecution of crime
- Assisting in identifying, apprehending, and prosecuting offenders
- Ensuring compliance with Council rules and regulations

Important: The CCTV system does not record audio.

The system is owned and controlled by Duston Parish Council, with operational oversight by the Clerk / Responsible Financial Officer (RFO). The Parish Council is registered as a data controller with the ICO for CCTV operation.

All authorised operators must comply with this Policy and the ICO CCTV Code of Practice to ensure collection, storage, and use of footage is lawful, necessary, and proportionate.

2. Scope

This Policy applies to all CCTV systems and associated equipment owned, operated, or controlled by the Parish Council. It covers the monitoring, recording, storage, retrieval, and disclosure of all recorded material.

The Parish Council will ensure:

- CCTV warning signs are clearly visible at all entrances
- Signage states the purpose of recording and provides contact details of the data controller (Appendix A)

Operation of CCTV systems complies with ICO guidance and all relevant data

protection legislation

Camera placement is designed to maximise effectiveness while minimising intrusion into areas with a reasonable expectation of privacy.

Monitoring is conducted in line with Council policies including:

- Equality & Diversity Policy
- Bullying & Harassment Policy
- Health & Safety Policy

3. Camera Locations

Cameras shall capture images only relevant to legitimate purposes. Every effort must be made to avoid infringing the privacy of individuals or neighbouring properties.

Typical monitoring areas include:

- Building perimeters, entrances, exits, and corridors
- Reception and lobby areas
- Car parks and public access routes
- Storage and service areas
- Security alarm and access control points

Camera locations are documented and retained by the Parish Council.

4. Covert Monitoring

Covert monitoring is only permissible in exceptional and lawful circumstances, where evidence-based suspicion of serious misconduct or criminal activity exists.

Requirements for covert monitoring:

- Written authorisation from the Clerk, in consultation with the Chair and Vice-Chair
- Formal documentation of rationale and duration
- Limited in scope and duration, proportionate to the suspected offence
- Never conducted in high-privacy areas (e.g., toilets, private offices)

All covert monitoring ceases immediately following investigation, with data securely disposed of in line with UK GDPR.

5. Storage & Retention

- Recorded material is securely stored to prevent unauthorised access, alteration, or disclosure
- Standard retention: 31 days, after which footage is overwritten or securely deleted
- Extended retention is permitted only when necessary, with:
 - o Documented justification
 - Secure, access-controlled storage
 - o Review and deletion once purpose is fulfilled

Retention must comply with UK GDPR principles of data minimisation and storage limitation (Article 5).

6. Access to CCTV Footage

Access is restricted to authorised personnel on a legitimate need-to-know basis.

- Authorisation from the Clerk or designated deputy is required to view or copy footage
- All access is logged: date, time, purpose, and identity of viewer
- Footage may not be removed or disclosed except in compliance with this Policy and UK data protection law

7. Subject Access Requests (SAR)

Individuals may request access to personal data, including CCTV footage:

- Requests must be submitted in writing to clerk@duston-pc.gov.uk
- Applicants must provide sufficient detail (date, time, location) to identify footage
- Supervised viewing may be permitted; copies are not provided
- Requests are responded to within 1 calendar month
- Disclosure may be refused if it infringes the rights of others or affects ongoing investigations

SARs are handled in accordance with the ICO Subject Access Code of Practice.

8. Disclosure to Third Parties

Disclosure is permitted only when lawful, necessary, and proportionate.

Permitted recipients include:

- Law enforcement agencies for crime prevention or investigation
- Legal representatives under Court Order or lawful authority
- Contractors/service providers under written confidentiality agreements

All disclosures must be authorised by the Clerk and logged: recipient, purpose, and legal basis.

9. Responsibilities

The Parish Council shall:

- Ensure CCTV use complies with this Policy and UK legislation
- Coordinate lawful operation of CCTV systems
- Maintain access and disclosure logs
- Review camera placement to uphold reasonable privacy expectations
- Secure recordings and restrict access to authorised personnel
- Delete footage after retention unless required for ongoing proceedings
- Approve use of zoom or mobile cameras to prevent unlawful surveillance

Training: All authorised personnel must complete data protection training.

10. Data Protection Impact Assessments (DPIA) & Privacy by Design

Prior to installation or relocation of CCTV cameras:

- Conduct a DPIA under Article 35 UK GDPR
- Assess privacy risks and proportionality
- Document mitigation measures to protect individuals' rights

Privacy-by-design principles are applied to all CCTV operations.

11. Policy Review

- Reviewed by the Clerk every 4 years, or sooner if legislation or ICO guidance changes
- Interim reviews follow incidents, legal developments, or ICO recommendations

Appendix A – CCTV Signage

It is a requirement of the Data Protection Act to notify people entering a CCTV protected area that the area is monitored by CCTV and that pictures are recorded. The Parish Council is to ensure that this requirement is fulfilled.

Signage must:

- Be clearly visible and legible
- State CCTV is in operation
- Identify Duston Parish Council as the data controller
- Provide contact details for enquiries

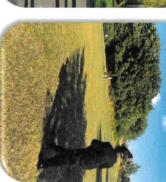

Attendance observations	Attendance of young people prior to the summer break was consistent and averaging 12-16 per week. Following an incident at the community centre, where some young people were rude to staff, a group were banned from accessing the centre and subsequently, the group — this led to a 'walk out' for another group of young people who felt their friends should not be banned — subsequently the following week only 1 young person was in attendance and thereafter (consistent with last summer) there was a significant drop off in attendance over the summer holidays. Outreach sessions were unsuccessful in terms of meeting new young people and there is a need for further promotion in the area. However, once the schools started back up, the September sessions were better attended, with our core group of young people returning and this is perhaps for consideration moving forward into the next 12 months of delivery, there is a need to review whether term-time provision is sufficient for the needs and wants of young people, and families in the Duston area.

Human Resources Support

1. Purpose of the Report

The purpose of this report is to inform Members about proposed changes to the way Human Resources (HR) are administered at Duston Parish Council and to seek Council's endorsement for progressing with an improved HR support service.

2. Background

Duston Parish Council currently employs eight members of staff, with two vacancies presently being recruited. As the Council continues to expand its responsibilities and take on additional community assets, there may be a need for further staff appointments in the future.

At present, HR support is provided by an external advisor at a cost of £100 + VAT per month. The Council's HR processes are still largely paper-based, including annual leave requests, sickness monitoring, and overtime records.

3. Modernising HR Administration

Modern HR practice increasingly uses cloud-based systems or apps that enable staff to request annual leave, record sickness, and log overtime electronically. This approach improves efficiency, accuracy, and compliance, while providing managers and the Clerk with real-time information on staffing matters.

The Clerk has undertaken a review of alternative HR providers who can deliver both the professional HR advice and digital systems necessary to modernise our approach.

4. Options Considered

Two national HR providers with expertise in the parish and town council sector were considered:

- WorkNest
- Peninsula

Both companies have experience working within local government frameworks, including the Green Book Terms and Conditions and the specific governance requirements involving elected members.

5. Recommended Provider

Following review, the Clerk recommends engaging **Peninsula** as the preferred provider. Peninsula offers a comprehensive package that includes:

- 24/7 HR support and advice
- Tailored documentation and policies
- Online HR management software
- Legal representation where required
- Health & Safety support, including creation of risk assessments

The service is designed specifically for organisations such as parish and town councils and provides the assurance of compliance and continuity in staff management.

The expected cost is £355 + VAT per month, representing a significant enhancement in service provision compared to the current arrangement.

6. Next Steps

The Clerk will proceed to finalise arrangements with Peninsula in consultation with the Chair and Vice-Chair, ensuring a smooth transition and the setup of the HR software for all staff.

7. Recommendation

That Full Council notes the report and endorses the Clerk's proposal to proceed with Peninsula for the provision of HR support and administration services. The contract with the current HR Advisor will be terminated and there is a notice period.
